

## Questions from the Book of Romans for Next Level 30

1. Romans 1:1-8— What truths did the Apostle Paul declare about Jesus Christ in verses 3-5?
2. Romans 1:9-19— What does Paul say about the gospel in verses 16-17?
3. Romans 1:20-27— What does nature and creation reveal to us about God so that every person is without excuse? Explain.
4. Romans 1:28-2:4— In chapter 1, Paul points out the “gross sinners” which make the “respectable sinners” he is talking to in chapter 2 sense pride and moral superiority. What did Paul have to say about those who felt morally superior? How does this apply to us?
5. Romans 2:5-16— Concerning the judgment of God, Paul says to all sinners in verse 5, “you are storing up wrath against yourself for the day of God’s wrath.” These verses say that God will judge all people some day. For those who have received Christ as Savior, their sins were judged and paid for by Christ’s death on the cross. What are five ways Paul says that God will judge non-believers in the final judgment? See verses 2, 6, 11, 15, and 16.

**6. Romans 2:17-29— In this passage Paul is speaking to the Jews about circumcision and the law. Give a short summary of his argument about the reality of what their Jewish faith had become. How can this apply to Christians today?**

**7. Romans 3:1-8— Paul talks about the advantages the Jews had over the Gentiles. Think back over your life from birth until now. Have you had any spiritual advantages? If so, what were they and how have they helped to grow as a Christian?**

**8. Romans 3:9-20— What is the purpose of the Law and 10 Commandments? Verses 19-20.**

**9. Romans 3:21-31— Chapters 3-5 of Romans speak of the work of justification where a person is declared righteous in God's sight the moment he puts his faith in Christ. After reading verses 21 to 28, give a brief summary of the content of the gospel found in these verses.**

**10. Romans 4:1-8— In these verses Paul gives the examples of Abraham and David. On what basis is a right relationship to God given or credited to us? What verse in Genesis did Paul give to prove his point in the life of Abraham?**

**11. Romans 4:9-15— After reading these verses, explain what Paul meant by saying that Abraham was counted right with God before he was circumcised?**

**12. Romans 4:16-25— The life of Abraham showed the power of God to “call things into existence that do not exist (verse 17b-CSB).” Abraham was “fully convinced that God had power to do what he had promised (verse 21).” Hebrews 11:6 says, “Without faith it is impossible to please God.” Where are you being stretched in your ability to trust God right now?**

**13. Romans 5:1-8— We are justified and declared righteous in God’s sight when we stop trying to earn our way to heaven through our own good works and completely depend on the finished work of Christ on the cross. What blessings and benefits do we presently receive as a result of being justified by faith? See verses 1-6.**

**14. Romans 5:9-14— What were the consequences of Adam’s sin? See verses 12, 16, and 18-19.**

**15. Romans 5:15-21— Christ is called the “last Adam” because He came to begin a new creation (I Corinthians 15:45). What are the benefits the believer receives because of the sacrificial death of Christ on the cross? See verses 16-19 and 21.**

**16. Romans 6:1-11— Chapters 6-8 speak of the process of sanctification where the believer is progressively becoming more and more like Christ as he applies the principles of scripture to his life. In verses 3-4, what spiritual realities does water baptism symbolize? How can knowledge of these realities allow us to live a life of ever increasing victory over sin (verses 5-11)?**

**17. Romans 6:12-23— What are the two types of slavery mentioned in verses 15 to 23? What is the end result of each type of slavery that is given in these verses?**

**18. Romans 7:1-6— Chapter 7 places an emphasis on power of the law (mentioned 21 times) and the importance for the believer to recognize he has died to the law and is no longer under its control. In verses 4-6, what points does Paul make on how we can bear fruit to God?**

**19. Romans 7:7-13— What was the purpose of the commandment (law) according to verse 13? Explain.**

**20. Romans 7:14-25— How did Paul describe his struggle with sin? How did He find deliverance from sin?**

**21. Romans 8:1-8— Who are the two persons mentioned in verses 1-4 that are vitally important for us to have victory over the power of sin in our lives? What part did or does each of these persons play in our lives for this victory to be accomplished? What is our part?**

**22. Romans 8:9-17— Reading these verses (9-17), enumerate the gifts or benefits we receive as a Christian? What are the requirements/obligations we have as a Christian?**

**23. Romans 8:18-27— What is the meaning of verse 23? “And not only the creation, but we ourselves who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for our adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies.”**

**24. Romans 8:28-39— Verses 28 to 39 are about the most comforting and incredible verses in the Bible. Give and amplify any three of the awesome promises given in these 12 verses.**

**25. Romans 9:1-9— Give the eight benefits the people of Israel had over the Gentiles as listed in verses 4-5.**

**26. Romans 9:10-18— Due to time and space we are not able to deal adequately with the doctrine of election. However, the teaching of election in this passage shows that it is God's sovereign choice to save us. We do not become Sons of God by our merit and good works, but because of God's mercy and grace. Read the following passages and explain whether they are describing God's sovereignty in election or mankind's choice-: John 3:16, John 6:37, Acts 13:48, Revelation 22:17. Is it God's will that people go to Hell? Read I Timothy 2:4, II Peter 3:9.**

**27. Romans 9:19-33— What was the reason that the Gentiles obtained righteousness and Israel did not? Who was the stumbling stone that the Jews stumbled over? Verses 30-33.**

**28. Romans 10:1-10— How is a person saved? Amplify. Verses 9-10.**

**29. Romans 10:11-21— What are the chain of events necessary for a person to be saved? Verses 14-17. Give a time, if any, in your life when you have had beautiful feet by taking the gospel to someone else? Verse 15.**

**30. Romans 11:1-10— Read verses 5-6. Is it easier for God to love you when you're good? Do you secretly believe that God chose you because you deserved it? Do you think that some people's behavior is so bad that God couldn't possibly save them? (questions from the Life Application Bible)**

**31. Romans 11:11-24— What amazing thing happened due to Israel's rejection of Christ as the Messiah? See verses 11-12.**

**32. Romans 11:25-32— Reading verses 11 to 27, give the verses that indicate that God has not permanently set aside his plan for Israel, but that Israel will once again return to the Lord under the rulership of Jesus the Messiah in the future.**

**33. Romans 11:33-12:2— Summarize in your own words the Doxology Paul gave in verses 33 to 36. Use a paraphrase version of the Bible if you wish.**

**34. Romans 12:3-13— After reading verses 9 to 13, choose any two of the commands listed and share with us why you think they are needed in your local church or in your life.**

**35. Romans 12:14-21— Verse 16 says, “Live in harmony with one another. Do not be proud, but be willing to associate with people of low position. Do not be conceited (NIV).” Explain some ways this verse should play out in our lives, our homes, our churches and our society.**

**36. Romans 13:1-7— What obligations do we have to government? Why is this important?**

**37. Romans 13:8-14— Verse 8 says, “Owe no one anything (ESV).” Does this mean we should never borrow money for a mortgage on a home, a car loan, or installment buying? What does a credit score say about a person?**

**38. Romans 14:1-8— In verses 1 to 8 Paul talks about different beliefs of Christians in his day concerning the eating of foods and whether to regard one day as special or not. Give the principles Paul lists in these 8 verses that we can apply today to our relationship with Christians who differ with us in areas of belief but does not touch any essential doctrine.**



**39. Romans 14:9-18— Verse 12 says, “So then, each one of us will give account of himself to God.” If our sins are paid for by the blood of Christ on the cross, why will believers face judgment?**

**40. Romans 14:19-23— Verse 23 says, “But whoever has doubts is condemned if he eats, because their eating is not from faith. For whatever does not proceed from faith is sin.” What does this verse mean and how do we apply it to our own personal life?**

**41. Romans 15:1-13— A major theme in this passage and in the Bible is “hope.” See verses 4 and 13. What does the Bible mean by the word “hope”? How do we increase in hope and why is hope important in the life of the believer?**

**42. Romans 15:14-22— In verse 20 Paul gives his mission statement as a church planter, evangelist and teacher. What is the mission statement that he gives in this verse? Do you have a spiritual mission statement? If so, what is it?**

**43. Romans 15:23-33— What were the specific prayer requests Paul gave to the believers in Rome? See verses 30 to 32. Were these requests answered? See Acts 23:10-11, 21:17-20A, 28:14-16.**

**44. Romans 16:1-16—** In these verses the Apostle Paul shows that loving relationships with fellow believers is of utmost importance in the Christian life after our relationship with Christ. Give a list of fellow believers in your life right now with which you have developed a close friendship and relationship.

**45. Romans 16:17-27—** Paul warned the believers in Rome to watch out for and avoid dividers and deceivers in the church. What were some of the teachings that caused divisions in the church during the time of the apostles? See II John 7-11, Acts 15:1, Galatians 3:1-3, and Colossians 2:16-19.
